- 5-B** I recommend the Board approve the proposed revisions to Policy 5.1813, entitled "Operational Procedures for Incidents and Actions for Secondary Students."

Development

CONSENT ITEM

- On September 30, the Board was ready to approve this Policy, except for the desire to research one issue: Do the principals want to retain the statement at the foot of the matrix that "*the Matrix provides MINIMUM Mandatory Actions for each incident. More severe consequences may be imposed at the discretion of the administrator*"? It is reported that representatives of the school administrators recently expressed overwhelming approval to maintain that statement. Dave Benson, who trains school administrators on using the matrix, plans to be available to explain the meaning of the statement at the Policy meeting on December 2.
 - Based on the Board's discussion at the Aug. 21st regular Board meeting, this version proposes to allow possession of cellular phones, while continuing the prohibition on their use. (Both use and possession of pagers/beepers must remain prohibited, per state law.). See lines 279-292.
 - At the first readings for development on June 17 and July 8, the School Board requested several amendments. Amendments based on the Board's discussion are described in the first part of the Executive Summary.
 - This Policy is intended to coordinate with proposed new Policy 5.1814, "Most Severe Consequences for Violent Acts."
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- **A brief Executive Summary of the committee's and School Board's changes is presented as follows:**

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This is a brief summary of the recommended changes including rationale for the changes to Policy 5.1812 – Operational Procedures for Incidents and Actions for Elementary Students – and Policy 5.1813 – Operational Procedures for Incidents and Actions for Secondary Students. (Once these policies are approved, then Policy 5.1811 – Student Code of Conduct Terms, will need to be updated to reflect the minor definitional changes and provide consistency between the policies.)

Additions to the Body of the Policy Text

In view of the Board's discussion on August 21, Code 21, Level 1, "Articles Disruptive to School" may be revised to allow possession, but not use, of cell phones. (Lines 279-292.) (Accordingly, under Code 21 "Prohibited Items, Non-Criminal," cell phones would be removed from the list of prohibited items. However, pagers/beepers remain prohibited by state law.)

Note: If students possess a cellular phone, it should be turned off and kept inside a book bag, purse, or similar container, and it may not be used (and may not be allowed to emit any ringtone or other noise) on school grounds or during any school-sponsored program or activity, including school transportation.

In view of the Board's discussion on In-school Suspension, the following sentence has been added to the text at lines 25-28:

For incidents that do not require an Out-of-School Suspension, schools should utilize In-School Suspension (ISS) wherever possible as an alternative to an Out-of-School Suspension.

Code **06** (Written Communication to the Parent/Guardian) is not on the matrix. Instead of adding it to the Matrix, the following sentence has been added to the text of the Policy at lines 52-54:

Additionally, every reasonable effort should be made to inform the parent(s)/guardian(s) of discipline incidents involving their children.

The Board discussed expulsion for serious verbal assaults and sexual harassment; thus, an "A" has been added to the expulsion column of the matrix for codes **32** (Repetitive Bullying, Harassing, Intimidating, or Threatening Behaviors) and **45** (Sexual Harassment). The length of the expulsion, however, would be better regulated in a separate Policy (5.1814) that is being proposed on that subject under the title "Most Severe Consequences for Violent Acts."

The Board discussed making expulsion under for Code **57** (Physical Aggression on a School Board Employee) and **96** (Battery on a School Board Employee) be without possibility of early reinstatement. However, it would be more appropriate to regulate length of expulsions in a separate Policy (5.1814) that is being proposed on that subject under the title "Most Severe Consequences for Violent Acts."

New Incident Codes

- Level 3 - # 57 – Physical Aggression on School Board Employee (volitional act; not accidental)
Rationale: Discipline committee recommendation; some of the physically aggressive acts by students were coded as a Level 4 Battery on School Board Employee even though the staff member did not want to press charges against the student for battery. The Level 4 code mandates a recommendation for expulsion. Many of these events required serious disciplinary consequences, but did not rise to the level of a recommendation for expulsion. (See lines 513-20.)
Example 1: Student pushes a teacher out of the way...teacher chooses not to press charges
Example 2: 3rd grade student pushes a teacher; the teacher presses charges; but mandatory expulsion *may not* be the most appropriate option for this student.

- Level 3 - # 67 – Counterfeit / Misrepresented Document / Other Major Incident (Lines 579-88)
Rationale: Discipline committee recommendation; several schools requested a Level 3 category to capture counterfeit money and other major incidents that didn't fit other categories.

- Level 4 - # 91 – Possession of a Handgun (Lines 748-53)
Rationale: State requires reporting of handguns separately from firearms. A code for firearms currently exists. This code will allow schools to report weapons more accurately.

Revised Incident Codes

- Level 1 - # 21 – Prohibited Items, non-criminal (Lines 297-302)
Expanded definition to include unauthorized possession or use of over-the-counter mild pain medication (or the child's own prescription medication) without parent approval and school notification.
Rationale: Discipline committee recommendation; Though very similar language currently exists in the Level 3 - # 71 *Unauthorized Possession or Misuse of Prescription Medication*, concerns were expressed about the mandatory 10-day suspension for legitimately using the over-the-counter medication (or the child's own prescription medication), yet circumventing the school's process for registering and dispensing medication. This addition allows Principals the discretion when evaluating an event of this type.

- Level 3 - # 71 – Unauthorized Possession or Misuse of Prescription Medication (Lines 598-606)
Expanded definition to specify another person's prescription medication, or misuse of one's own; also clarifies relationship to mild over-the-counter pain medications listed in Code 21. This amendment focuses on deterring illegal possession/misuse of prescription medication that was not prescribed for the student, as well as unlawful or dangerous misuse of the student's own prescription medication.

New Action Codes

- Prevention Consequences - # 13 – Parent/Guardian Contact by a Language Facilitator (NOTE: this code does NOT appear on the Matrix, because it is included within the "PC" column).
Rationale: Provides a code for a parental contact by a language facilitator in the event of a language barrier.

- Early Intervention Consequences - # 25 – Referral to School CORE Team
Rationale: A code added after the policy was approved to assist in providing services for students through the school CORE Team. (This was added to the Matrix.)

- Disciplinary Consequences - # 50 – Alternative to Suspension for Student Misconduct
Rationale: A newly developed Alternative to Suspension program needs a separate code to distinguish it from the other Alternative to Suspension programs. (This was added to the Matrix.)

- Disciplinary Consequences - # 88 – Out of School Suspension for Days Held in Abeyance
Rationale: The discipline committee recommended a suspension code to address additional suspension days for non-completion of alternative to suspension programs. (NOTE: This is NOT on the Matrix, because it does not arise from a new incident; it is connected to the original incident.)

42 appropriate action(s), locate the cells found at the intersection of the incident
43 (rows) and action codes which are identified by the numbers at the top of the
44 column. The actions represented by the codes are listed in the box to the right of
45 the matrix. Minimum mandatory consequences (actions which **MUST** be imposed
46 as a minimum consequence for first time offenses) are indicated by an "X."
47 Additional consequences (those actions from which an administrator **MAY**
48 **ADDITIONALLY** choose to impose for more serious or repeated actions) are
49 indicated by an "A." Mandatory actions (those actions which **MUST** be imposed)
50 are indicated by an "M." By providing a minimum mandatory consequence with
51 additional options for all of the incidents, an administrator can address the
52 severity of the incident with the actions imposed. **Additionally, every**
53 **reasonable effort should be made to inform the parent(s)/guardian(s) of**
54 **discipline incidents involving their children.**

445 general indication of a possible place and time (though these
446 signs still fall well short of a detailed plan); There is no strong

450 book or movie that shows the planning of a violent act, or a

460 1. Crimes Against Persons Incidents

461 a. Code 50 **Fighting**

462 Mutual participation in a hostile, physical encounter; mutual
463 participation in an altercation involving physical violence.
464

465 b. Code 51 **Verbal Assault on a Student/Person (Non-School Board**
466 **Employee)**

467 Any intentional, unlawful threat, by word or act, to do violence to
468 another person, coupled with an apparent ability to do so, and

469 doing some act that creates a well-founded fear in another
470 person that violence is imminent.

471
472 c. Code 52 **Verbal Assault on School Board Employee**

473 Any intentional, unlawful threat, by word or act, to do violence to
474 a school board employee, coupled with an apparent ability to do
475 so, and doing some act that creates a well-founded fear in
476 another person that violence is imminent.

477
478 d. Code 53 **Physical Battery on a Student/Person (Non-School Board
479 Employee)**

480 The willful and unlawful use of force or violence upon the
481 person of another. Three primary elements must be present for
482 a Battery to occur: (1) there must be an aggressor, who (2)
483 intended to cause physical harm (or actual contact against the
484 other's will) to (3) an another person. Includes an attack with a
485 weapon that fits the aforementioned description. (**Note:** *This*
486 *category should be used only when the attack is serious*
487 *enough to warrant contacting law enforcement.*)

488
489 e. Code 54 **To Attempt a Criminal Act Against a Person**

490 Any person who attempts to commit, or who solicits another to
491 commit, or who agrees, conspires, combines, or confederates
492 with another person or persons to commit the offense of a
493 Battery, Robbery, Homicide, Kidnapping, or Sexual Battery
494 against another person or persons, and in such attempt does
495 any act toward the commission of such offense, but fails in the
496 perpetration or is intercepted or prevented in the execution of
497 the offense. (Fla. Stat. § 774.04)

498
499 f. Code 55 **Extortion/Blackmail/Coercion**

500 The use or threat or intimidation to obtain anything of value
501 from another person, including, but not limited to, money.
502 (**Note:** Minor offenses that do NOT require law enforcement
503 should be coded as **Code 17 Bullying** or **Code 32 Repetitive**
504 **Bullying, Harassing, Intimidating, or Threatening Behavior.**)

505
506 g. Code 56 **Robbery**

507 The taking or attempting to take anything of value that is owned
508 by another person or organization, under confrontational
509 circumstances by force or threat of force or violence and/or by
510 putting the victim in fear. A key difference between robbery and
511 larceny is that a threat of battery is involved in robbery.

512

513 **h. Code 57 Physical Aggression on a School Board Employee**
514 **A *volitional* physically-aggressive act such as pushing,**
515 **pulling, or striking toward a School Board employee.**
516 **Generally, the physical act does not result in injury. Law**
517 **enforcement should be notified; criminal charges may or**
518 **may not be filed. (NOTE: IF A RECOMMENDATION FOR**
519 **EXPULSION IS PROPOSED, then the Level 4 code # 96,**
520 **Battery on SBE, should be used.)**

526 a. Code 60 **Stealing More than Fifty Dollars (\$50)**

527 The unlawful taking or concealing the property of another

533 b. Code 61 **Vandalism More than One Hundred Dollars (\$100) (Includes**
534 **Materials and Labor)**

535 The willful and/or malicious destruction, damage, or defacement
536 of public or private property, real or personal, without the
537 consent of the owner or the person having custody or control of
538 it. This category, which includes graffiti, should be coded when
539 the amount of damage to the property, including materials and
540 labor, exceeds one hundred dollars (\$100) to repair, remove,
541 and/or replace. (**NOTE:** If the damage to the property, including
542 materials and labor, is less than one hundred dollars (\$100). to
543 repair, then the event should be coded as **Code 35 Abuse of**
544 **School Property/Minor Vandalism** unless Law Enforcement
545 files charges.)
546

547 c. Code 62 **Breaking and Entering/Burglary (Illegal Entry into a Facility)**

548 The unlawful entry with or without force into a building,
549 conveyance, or other structure, or remaining behind, with the
550 intent to commit a crime to property.
551

552 d. Code 63 **Computer Misuse/Inappropriate Use of E-mail/Internet**

553 The inappropriate use of a computer, including, but not limited
554 to, breaking into restricted accounts or networks, modifying, or
555 destroying files without permission, illegally copying software,
556 and entering or distributing or printing unauthorized files.

557 Accessing or entering unauthorized internet sites; Distributing
558 inappropriate electronic messages.

559
560 e. Code 64 **Reckless Vehicle Use**
561 The use of any motorized or self-propelled vehicle on school
562 grounds in a reckless manner or so as to threaten the health,
563 safety, welfare of others, or to disrupt the educational process.

564
565 f. Code 65 **Motor Vehicle Theft**
566 The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. *Examples:* theft
567 of a car, truck, motorcycle, golf cart, dune buggy, RV or
568 anything that is self-propelled.

569
570 g. Code 66 **Arson**
571 To willfully and unlawfully, or while in the commission of any
572 felony, by fire or explosion, damage or cause to be damaged:
573 any dwelling, whether occupied or not, or its contents; any
574 structure, or contents thereof, where persons are normally
575 present; and any other structure that the person knew or had
576 reasonable grounds to believe was occupied by a human being
577 (Fla. Stat. § 806.01(1)(a)-(c)).

578
579 **h. Code 67 Counterfeit / Misrepresented Document / Other Major**
580 **Incident**
581 To fashion or reproduce a document, money, or other items
582 with the intent to defraud; includes counterfeit money or
583 documents; Also, any Level 3-type incident that is inappropriate
584 in a school setting and does not fit into another Level 3
585 category. Included in this category is culpable negligence,
586 exposing another person to personal injury. (NOTE: Any
587 incident in this category REQUIRES law enforcement
588 intervention.)

589
590 3. Alcohol, Tobacco, and Drug Incidents

591 a. Code 70 **Possession/Use of Tobacco Products**
592 Possession, use, sale, storage, or distribution of tobacco
593 products on school district property. Tobacco products include,
594 but are not limited to, cigarettes, cigars, snuff, dip, pipe tobacco,
595 and chewing tobacco.

596
597 b. Code 71 **Unauthorized Possession or Misuse of Prescription**
598 **Medication**
599 To possess, use, store, or be under the influence of another
600 person's any—substance which requires a physician's

601 prescription; or to misuse one's own prescription medication; or
602 to posses, store, or use any over-the-counter medication (other
603 than those listed in Code 21) without parental approval and
604 school notification.
605

606 c. Code 72 **Use of Intoxicants**

607 The inhaling or ingestion of intoxicants, including but not limited
608 to, glue, solvents, butane, and whip crème, for the purpose of
609 obtaining a mood-modifying experience.
610

611 d. Code 73 **Possession, Use, Manufacture, Sale, Storage, or**
612 **Distribution of Alcohol or Intoxicating Beverages**

613 The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture,
614 sale, purchase, transportation, possession or use of intoxicating
615 alcoholic beverages. Use should be reported only if the person
616 is caught in the act of using, or is discovered to have used in
617 the course of the investigation.
618

619 e. Code 74 **Possession, Use, Sale, Storage, or Distribution of Drug**
620 **Paraphernalia**

621 To possess, use, sale, store, or distribute any equipment,
622 device, or equipment used for the purpose of preparing or
623 taking drugs, including, but not limited to, items listed in Fla.
624 Stat. § 893.145, and items which may be determined to be drug
625 paraphernalia under the criteria set out in Fla. Stat. § 893.146.
626

627 f. Code 75 **Possession, Use, or Storage of Drugs or Imitation Drugs**
628 **Represented as Drugs**

629 To store, possess, purchase, use, or be under the influence of
630 any mood-modifying substance and/or dangerous substance
631 listed in Chapter 893, Fla. Stat., including, but not limited to,
632 marijuana, hallucinogens, inhalants, as well as any substance
633 represented to be an illegal substance, such as “designer
634 drugs,” or caffeine pills, tablets, or caplets, or any substance
635 which is represented to be any such substance while on school
636 property or jurisdiction of the School District of Palm Beach
637 County.
638

639
640 4. Disorderly Conduct/Weapons
641

642 a. Code 80 **Disruption of a School Function/Disorderly Conduct**

643 Any act which substantially disrupts the orderly conduct of a
644 school function, behavior which substantially disrupts the

645 orderly learning environment or poses a threat to the health,
646 safety, and/or welfare of students, staff, or others. An incident of
647 this type is mandatory to be reported to law enforcement and is
648 likely to result in an arrest.

649
650 b. Code 81 **Trespassing**

651 To enter or remain on a public school campus, school board
652 facility, or at a school function without authorization or invitation
653 and with no lawful purpose for entry, including students under
654 suspension or expulsion. To enter or remain on a public school
655 campus, school board facility, or at a school district sponsored
656 activity without authorization after being directed to leave by the
657 chief administrator/designee of the facility, campus, or function.
658

659 c. Code 82 **False Fire/911 Call**

660 Whoever, without reasonable cause, by outcry or the ringing of
661 bells, or otherwise makes or circulates, or causes to be made or
662 circulated, a false alarm of fire or 911 call.
663

664 d. Code 83 **Bomb Threat**

665 Intentionally making a false report to any person, including
666 school personnel, concerning the placement of any bomb,
667 dynamite, explosive, or arson-causing device.
668

669 e. Code 84 **Inappropriate, Lewd or Obscene Act**

670 The use of oral or written language, electronic messages,
671 pictures, objects, gestures, or engaging in any physical act
672 considered to be offensive, socially unacceptable, or not
673 suitable for an educational setting. Included in this category are
674 indecent exposure (exposure of private body parts to the sight
675 of another person in a lewd or indecent manner in a public
676 place), and obscenity (conduct which by the community
677 standards is deemed to corrupt public morals by its indecency
678 and/or lewdness such as phone calls or other communication;
679 unlawful manufacture, publishing, selling, buying or possessing
680 materials such as literature or photographs).
681

682 f. Code 85 **Sexual Misconduct**

683 Engaging in a sex act or physical conduct of a sexual nature;
684 the unlawful sexual intercourse, sexual contact or other
685 unlawful behavior or conduct intended to result in sexual
686 gratification without force or threat and where the victim is
687 capable of giving consent.
688

689 g. Code 86 **Possession of a Knife**
690 The possession of any knife that may inflict harm on another
691 person, or could be used to intimidate another person,
692 including, but not limited to, fixed blade knives, folding knives,
693 switch blade knives, razor knives, box cutters. (**Note:** If a
694 weapon is used during an incident, that incident should be
695 coded including an appropriate corresponding weapons-related
696 entry AND disciplinary action may increase substantially.)

697
698 h. Code 87 **Possession of Other Potentially Dangerous Items**
699 Any instrument or object, other than firearms, handguns, or
700 knives, that could be deliberately used to inflict harm on another
701 person, or could be used to intimidate any person. Included in
702 this category are BB-guns and toy or replica guns represented
703 as real guns. Also, included in this category are the possession
704 or storage of items which are prohibited at school, including, but
705 not limited to ammunition clips, bullets or cartridges, flammable
706 liquids, combustible materials, matches, lighters, poisonous
707 substances, mace, pepper spray, and any other items which
708 may result in injury. (**Note:** If a weapon is used during an
709 incident, that incident should be coded including an appropriate
710 corresponding weapons-related entry AND disciplinary action
711 may increase substantially.)
712

713 ~~FS~~ **Felony Suspension Act**

714 ~~This incident code should be used for a student who has been~~
715 ~~felony suspended per Florida Statute, and is assigned to an~~
716 ~~alternative program until the student is adjudicated. If the~~
717 ~~student is adjudicated guilty, the principal may recommend~~
718 ~~expulsion.~~

720 D. Level 4 - Criminal Incidents

722 1. Code 89 **Threat of Violence, High Level**
723 High level of threat is a threat that appears to pose an imminent
724 and serious danger to the safety of others; the threat is direct,
725 specific, and plausible; the threat suggests concrete steps have
726 been taken toward carrying it out, for example, statements
727 indicating that the threatener has acquired or practiced with a
728 weapon or has had the victim under surveillance.
729

730 2. Code 90 **Possession of a Firearm**
731 Possession or sale of any firearm on school property, school
732 sponsored transportation or during a school sponsored activity.

733 A firearm is any weapon (including a starter gun) which will, is
734 designed to, or may readily be converted to expel a projectile by
735 the action of an explosive; the frame or receiver of any such
736 weapon; any firearm muffler or firearm silencer; any destructive
737 device; or any machine gun. The term firearm does not include
738 an antique firearm unless the antique firearm is used in the
739 commission of a crime. (**Note:** Fla. Stat. § 790.001(6)). A
740 destructive device is any bomb, grenade, mine, rocket, missile,
741 pipe bomb, or similar device containing some type of explosive
742 that is designed to explode and is capable of causing bodily
743 harm or property damage (Fla. Stat. § 790.001(4)). (Note: If a
744 weapon is used during an incident, that incident should be
745 coded including an appropriate corresponding weapons-related
746 entry.)

747
748 **3. Code 91 Possession of a Handgun**
749 **Possession or sale of a handgun on school property,**
750 **school-sponsored transportation, or during a school-**
751 **sponsored activity. (NOTE: If a handgun is used during**
752 **an incident, that incident should be coded including an**
753 **appropriate corresponding weapons-related entry.)**

754
755 **3. 4. Code 92 Possession, Use, Sale, Storage, or Distribution of an**
756 **Explosive Device (Not Firecrackers, Poppers)**

757 An explosive is any chemical compound or mixture that has the
758 property of yielding readily to combustion or oxidation upon
759 application of heat, flame, or shock, including but not limited to
760 dynamite, nitroglycerin, trinitrotoluene, or ammonium nitrate
761 when combined with other ingredients to form an explosive
762 mixture, blasting caps, and detonators (Fla. Stat. §790.001(5)).
763 **Note:** If an explosive device is used during an incident, that
764 incident should be coded including an appropriate
765 corresponding weapons-related entry.)

767 **4. 5. Code 93 Sale, Possession With Intent to Sell or Distribute, or**
768 **Distribution of Drugs, Imitation Drugs Represented as Drugs, or**
769 **Prescription Medications**

770 To sell or distribute any mood-modifying substance and/or
771 dangerous **substance listed in Chapter 893, Fla. Stat.,**
772 **including, but not limited to marijuana, hallucinogens,**
773 **inhalants, as well as any substance represented to be an illegal**
774 **substance, such as "designer drugs." or caffeine pills, tablets,**
775 **or caplets, or any substance which is represented to be any**

776 such substance while on school district property, school
777 transportation, or at a school related function.

779 5. 6. Code 94 **Aggravated Battery**

780 Intentionally or knowingly causing great bodily harm, permanent
781 disability, or permanent disfigurement or using a deadly weapon
782 while committing a battery. A battery is the actual and
783 intentional touching or striking of another person against his or
784 her will or intentionally causing bodily harm to an individual (Fla.
785 Stat. §§ 784.03 & 784.045).
786

787 6. 7. Code 95 **Armed Robbery**

788 The taking of money or other property which may be the subject
789 of larceny from the person or custody of another, with intent to
790 either permanently or temporarily deprive the person or the
791 owner of the money or other property, when in the course of the
792 taking there is the use of force, violence, assault, or putting in
793 fear; with the use of a firearm or other deadly weapon (Fla. Stat.
794 § 812.13(1) & (2)(a)).
795

796 7. 8. Code 96 **Battery or Aggravated Battery on a School Board**
797 **Employee**

798 A battery or aggravated battery, as defined above, on any
799 person that the student knows, or has reason to know, is an
800 elected official or school district employee, whether it is
801 committed on school property, on school sponsored
802 transportation, during a school sponsored activity or while the
803 elected official or employee is on official school business. (Fla.
804 Stat. § ~~234.06~~ 230.23015).
805

806 8. 9. Code 97 **Sexual Battery (Attempted or Actual Forcible Penetration)**

807 Forced oral, anal, or vaginal penetration by, or union with, the
808 sexual organ of another or the anal or vaginal penetration of

811 9. 10. Code 98 **Kidnapping or Abduction**

812 Forcibly, secretly, or by threat, confining, abducting, or
813 imprisoning another person against their will and without lawful

817 The unlawful killing of a human being (Fla. Stat. § 782.04); and
818 manslaughter - the killing of a human being by the act,

819 procurement, or culpable negligence of another, without lawful

1023 2. Code 31 **Bus, Probation**

1024 An alternative to a Bus Suspension. A student placed on Bus
1025 Probation will, very likely, be suspended from the school bus if
1026 another bus violation occurs.
1027

1028 3. Code 32 **Bus, Suspension**

1029 Suspension of bus riding privileges for a specified period of time.
1030 (Consequences for violations of transportation policies, rules, or
1031 standards of conduct are not limited to the suspension of bus riding
1032 privileges. Other sanctions, up to and including out of school
1033 suspension and expulsion may be imposed when warranted).

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D. Disciplinary Consequences

1. Code 40 **School Service Work (Before/After School/Non-School Day)**
The assignment of a student to work detail before or after school hours. Generally, this is used in lieu of a detention and the student is paired with a staff member to perform the duties as determined. (NOTE: Refer to **Code 21 School Service Work (During School Hours)** work detail.)
2. Code 41 **Detention (Regular/Traditional)**
Required attendance for a monitored period of time (generally an hour after school) not during school hours.
3. Code 42 **Detention (Extended)**
Required attendance for an extended monitored period of time before or after school hours.
4. Code 43 **Saturday School/Detention**
Required attendance for a monitored period of time on a Saturday.
5. Code 44 **Confiscation**
The confiscating of an item(s) not permitted on school grounds. Depending on the item(s), the item(s) could be turned over to law enforcement, held until parent/guardian came to retrieve it, or returned to the student after a specified period of time.
6. Code 45 **Loss of Extra-Curricular Privileges**
The loss of an extra-curricular privilege such as attending events not during school hours, removal from an athletic team or club, and/or exclusion from a specified activity.
7. Code 46 **Restitution**
Repayment for damages or loss.
8. Code 47 **Tobacco/Alcohol/Drug Alternative**
A program designed to educate the student about tobacco, alcohol, and/or drugs and to deter future use. Generally, this is used as an alternative to an out of school suspension and/or to shorten the length of the suspension.
9. Code 48 **Days Held in Abeyance**

1077 Out-of-school suspension days issued, but not enforced if an
1078 alternative plan is completed. *Examples:* Tobacco, alcohol, or drug
1079 education classes.
1080

1081 **10. Code 50 Student Misconduct, Alternative to Suspension Program**

1082 **A program designated to educate the student about anger**
1083 **management and to deter future student misconduct.**
1084 **Generally, this is used as an alternative to an out-of-school**
1085 **suspension and to reduce the number of days of a student**
1086 **suspension.**
1087

1088 10. **11.** Code 60 **In-School Intervention Program**

1089 A school-designed program or class that requires the student to

1095 11. **12.** Code 65 **In-School Alternative to Suspension**

1096 An alternative to an out-of-school suspension that prevents a

1098 alternative to suspension, the student is assigned to a
1099 self-contained alternative classroom.
1100

1101 12. **13.** Code 81 **Out of School Suspension, Short-Term (One (1) to Two (2)**
1102 **Days)**

1103 The temporary removal of a student from school for a period of one
1104 (1) to two (2) days. During the out-of-school suspension, the
1105 student is prohibited from attendance at school or any
1106 school-related functions. **Note:** Fla. Stat. § 232.26(1) establishes
1107 that no secondary or elementary school student may be suspended
1108 out of school for unexcused tardies, lateness, absence, or truancy.
1109

1110 13. **14.** Code 83 **Out of School Suspension, Short-Term (Three (3) to Five (5)**
1111 **Days)**

1112 The temporary removal of a student from school for a period of ~~one~~
1113 ~~(4) three (3)~~ to five (5) days. During the out of school suspension,
1114 the student is prohibited from attendance at school or any
1115 school-related functions. **Note:** Fla. Stat. § 232.26(1) establishes
1116 that no secondary or elementary school student may be suspended
1117 out of school for unexcused tardies, lateness, absence, or truancy.

1119 14. Code 86 **Out of School Suspension, Long-Term (Six (6) to Ten (10)**
1120 **Days)**

1121 The temporary removal of a student from school for a period of six
1122 (6) to ten (10) days. During the out of school suspension, the
1123 student is prohibited from attendance at school or any
1124 school-related functions. **Note:** Fla. Stat. § 232.26(1) establishes
1125 that no secondary or elementary school student may be suspended
1126 out of school for unexcused tardies, lateness, absence, or truancy.
1127

1128 **15. Code 88 Out of School Suspension for Days Held in Abeyance**

1129 **An out-of-school suspension code specifically designated to**
1130 **address additional suspension days due to non-completion of**
1131 **an Alternative to Suspension program. This out-of-school**
1132 **suspension is a temporary removal of a student from school for**
1133 **a period of days equal to the days held in abeyance for the**
1134 **particular event. During the out-of-school suspension, the**
1135 **student is prohibited from attendance at school or any school-**
1136 **related functions. Note: Fla. Stat. § 232.26(1) establishes that**
1137 **no secondary or elementary school student may be suspended**
1138 **out of school for unexcused tardiness, lateness, absence, or**

1141 **45-16. Code 90 Out of School Suspension, Mandatory Ten (10) Days**

1142 The temporary removal of a student from school for a mandatory
1143 period of ten (10) days. During the out of school suspension, the
1144 student is prohibited from attendance at school or any
1145 school-related functions. **Note:** Fla. Stat. § 232.26(1) establishes
1146 that no secondary or elementary school student may be suspended
1147 out of school for unexcused tardies, lateness, absence, or truancy.
1148

1149 E. District Imposed Consequences

1151 1. Code 91 **Long-Term Suspension (District Approved and Entered)**

1152 Fla. Stat. § 230.33 permits the superintendent to extend a
1153 suspension beyond ten (10) school days if the student is being

1158 The assignment by the district to an alternative school for a

1168 The assignment by the district to an alternative school in lieu of an
1169 expulsion. (**Note:** This is likely a change of placement rather than a
1170 number of days.)

1172 4.5. Code 98 Honoring an Expulsion from another District

1173 Process by which a student who is pending expulsion, has been
1174 expelled, or has withdrawn in lieu of expulsion from another school
1175 district or private school is reviewed prior to attending school in
1176 Palm Beach County School District.
1177

1178 5.6. Code 99 Expulsion

1179 The removal of the right and obligation of a student to attend public
1180 school for a specified period of time. An expulsion may be imposed
1181 for a period up to, but not to exceed the current school year, the
1182 following school year, and the intervening summer school.
1183

1184 6.7. Code FS Felony Suspension Action

1185 Action code when a principal determines to felony suspend a
1186 student pending adjudication.
